



# SUTHERLAND IMPACT AND RECOVERY SURVEY 2020

Developed by the Sutherland Adaptive and Collaborative Communities Team, managed by the Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust in partnership with Sutherland Community Planning Partnership, and funded by the Aspiring Communities Fund from the Scottish Government and European Social Fund.

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## **BACKGROUND**

### **Sutherland Community Engagement Project – 2018/2019**

In 2018 the Sutherland Community Partnership (SCP), with the Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust (KoSDT), launched the Community Engagement project, funded by the Scottish Government's Aspiring Communities Fund.

The outcome of the project was the creation of Locality Plans for five priority areas identified across Sutherland which were published in 2019. The priority areas were identified, based on a range of data sources, as Golspie, Brora, Helmsdale, Creich and Kinlochbervie.

During the project, the SCP recognised that other areas in the county would benefit from a similar consultation. The Community Engagement team carried out additional work across Sutherland and additional Community Plans were published.

### **Sutherland Adaptive and Collaborative Communities Project – 2020/2022**

Building on the success of the Community Engagement project the SCP, with KoSDT, was successful in a further application to the Aspiring Communities Fund. The Sutherland Adaptive and Collaborative Communities (SACC) project started in August 2020 and will run to April 2022.

The SACC project is informed by the Locality and Community Plans published in 2019 and will feature collaborative and community-led working. Focussing on the five priority areas the Project Team is working with the Locality Groups to advance their Plans and supporting them drive development forward by identifying and planning community-led projects, aimed at tackling inequalities, to deliverable stage.

The project will also work across Sutherland by developing theme-based projects aimed at tackling inequalities and further identified priorities across the county. The project aims to bring new or enhanced services to some of the most vulnerable and hardest to reach communities through partnership and collaborative working.

### **Covid-19 Impact - 2020**

The SCP are aware that the Covid-19 pandemic has impacted communities across Sutherland to varying degrees during 2020.

The SACC project must respond accordingly. The first phase of the SACC project was to undertake this Survey to review priorities which were previously identified and assess their relevance against the Covid-19 pandemic. The SACC project work will reflect the Priority and Additional Themes identified within the Survey to support communities recover from the impact of Covid-19.

## INTRODUCTION

The Sutherland Impact and Recovery Survey was available for four weeks between September and October 2020. It was predominantly promoted through e-mail and social media activity.

Notifications of the Survey were distributed by e-mail, advertised on a variety of Facebook pages and advertised in the Northern Times and Kyle Chronicle publications.

Paper copies were offered if required, there was no uptake on this offer. Due to Covid-19 restrictions it was deemed not safe or appropriate to circulate paper copies which were not pre-requested.

All responses received were online through the surveymonkey link. A total of 84 responses were received.

## DATA ANALYSIS METHODOLOGY

Analysis of survey data was carried out using a mixed methods approach: quantitative and qualitative.

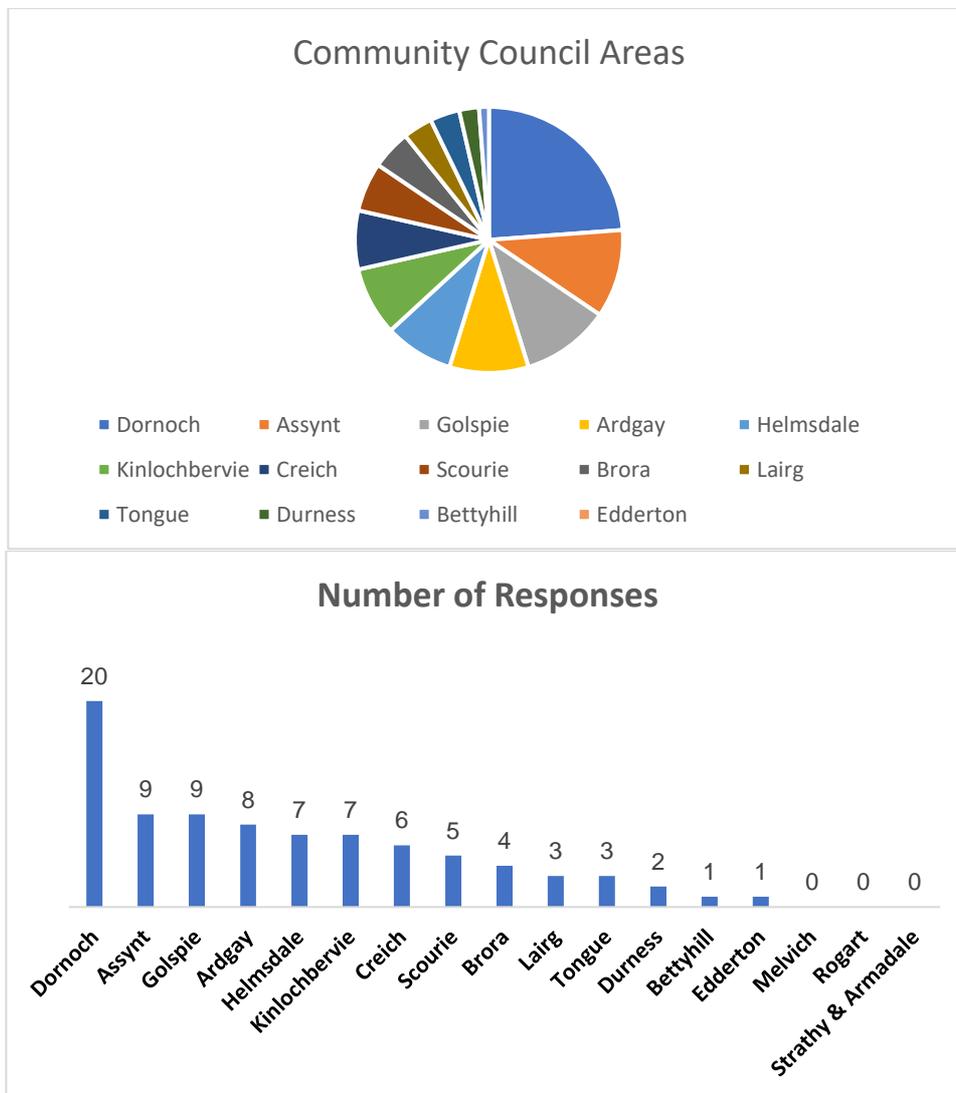
Due to the nature of the survey's design ratings from respondents to each category (e.g. Public Transport, Housing, etc.) were averaged in order to gain an overview of priorities in the community. To fully understand and accurately convey the views of respondents, analysis of open responses to each question was also needed.

Individual comments were analysed to identify the **common themes** within each question. By grouping comments into common themes, it was possible to identify priorities by counting the number of times a common theme had been mentioned.

For example, in the category of "Housing" if a comment stated "*Housing is too expensive*" this was annotated "House prices". This was repeated for each comment within each category and once this had been done the frequency of each annotation within that category was recorded, providing the themes within respondent's comments on each category and the frequency that they occur provide context for the average ratings of the categories.

## RESPONSES AND RESPONDENTS

A total of 84 responses to the survey were received from community groups and individuals across Sutherland.



From the 17 Community Council areas across Sutherland responses were received from 82%, or 14 of the areas. Of the 84 responses, 60 were completed as a resident and 24 were completed on behalf of a community organisation.

The response rate is recognised as low in relation to the total population of Sutherland, circa 12,000 to 13,000.

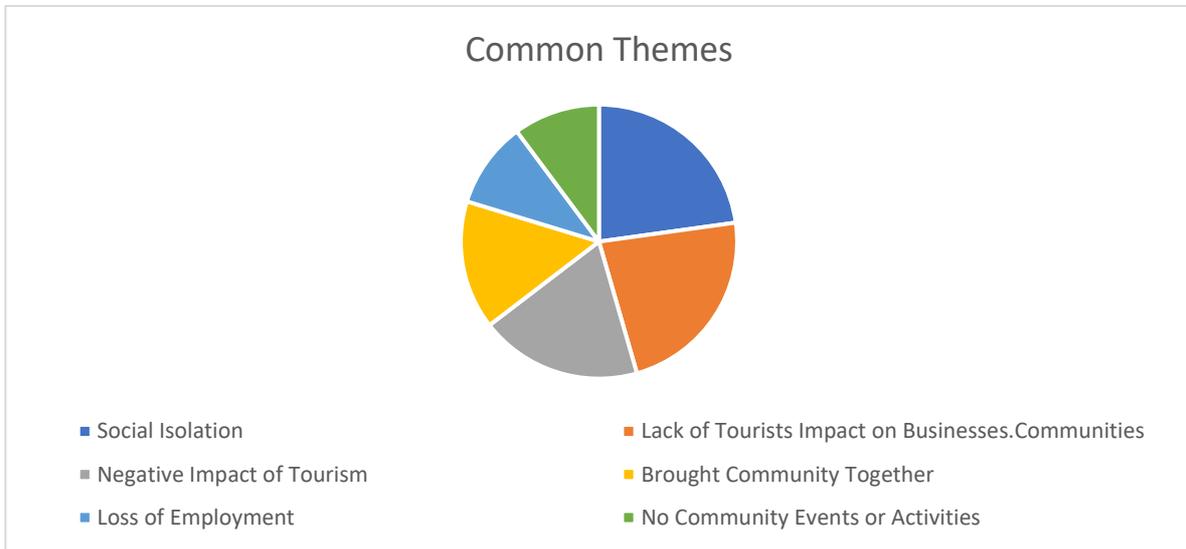
The data gathered within the Survey is being used as indicative only and will not dictate specific project activity without further evidence or guidance from strategic partners of the SACC project.

The 84 responses have been broken down into the five priority Locality areas and details of the data gathered was input to Locality Group meetings post the Survey closing in December 2020. The locality data has informed Locality Groups on local priorities, it should be noted that due to the scale of the response rate the data will not define project activity locally. The Survey was managed as a soft touch approach and as an introduction to the SACC project but is not the core focus of activity.

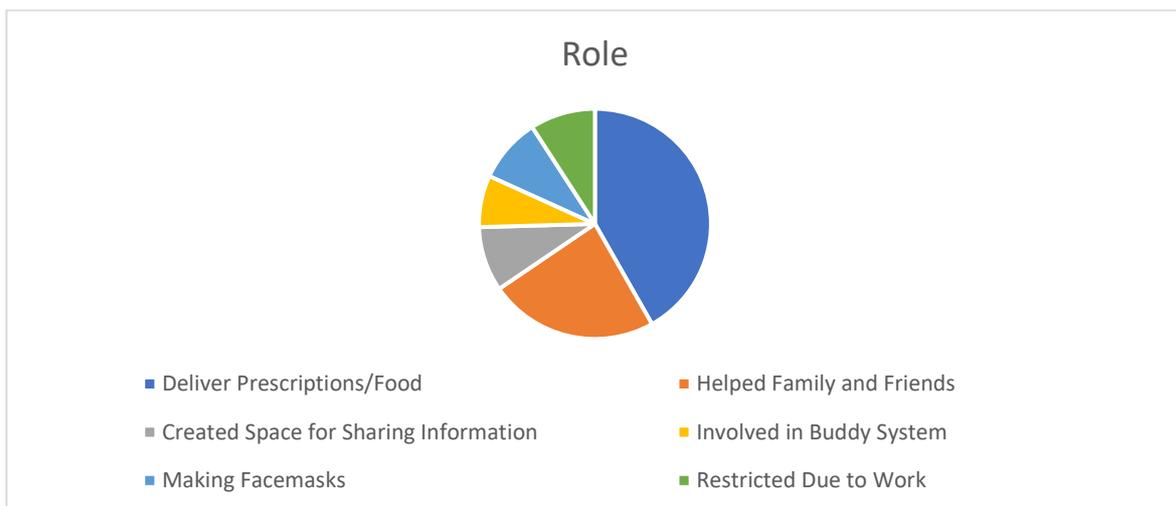
Please give us a summary about what impact the Covid-19 pandemic has had on your community: From the responses received the top common themes mentioned were:

Please tell us about the role you have played in supporting your community overcome the impact of Covid-19: From the responses received the top common themes mentioned were:

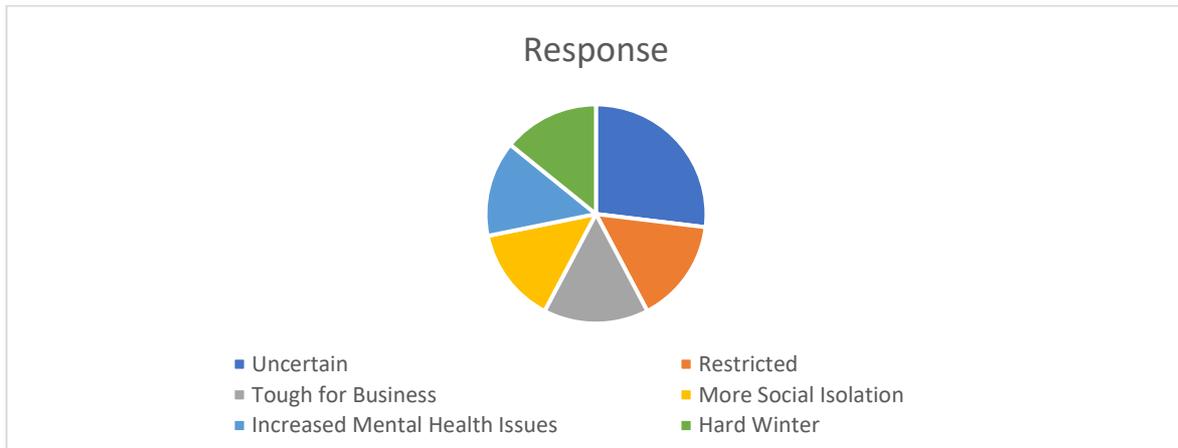

From the responses received the top common themes mentioned were:

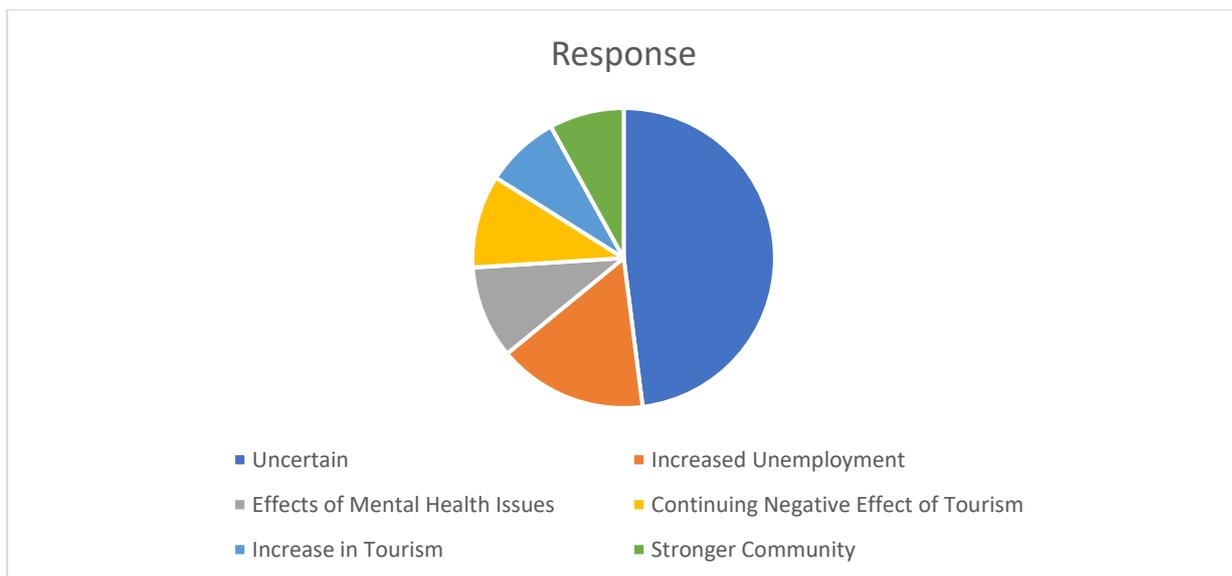

**What does the future look like in your community because of Covid-19 in 12 months time:**

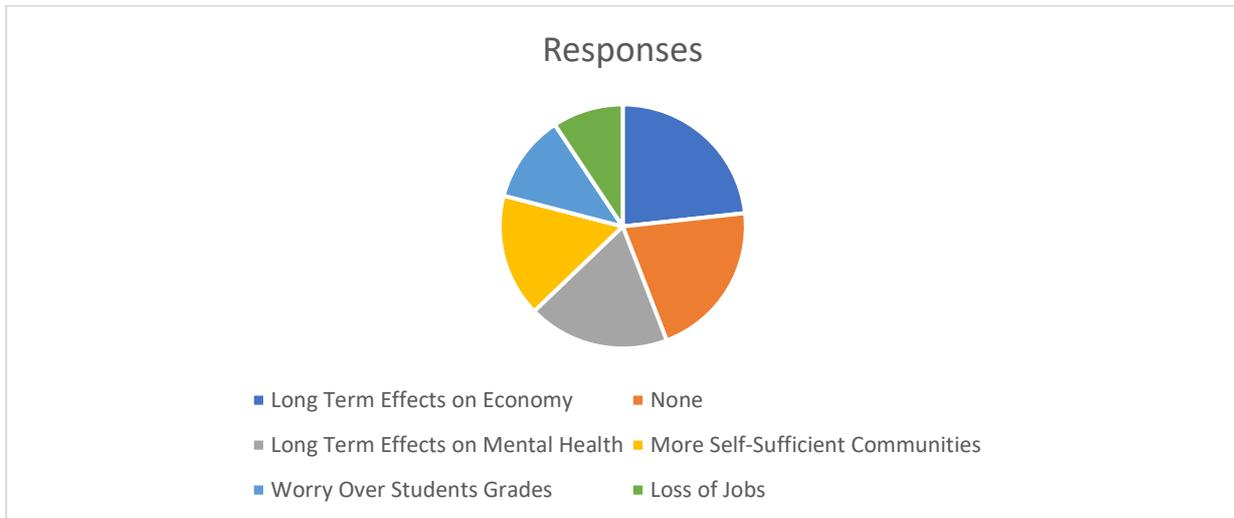
From the responses received the top common themes mentioned were:

**Do you have any concerns or aspirations about the future because of Covid-19:** From the responses received the top common themes mentioned were:

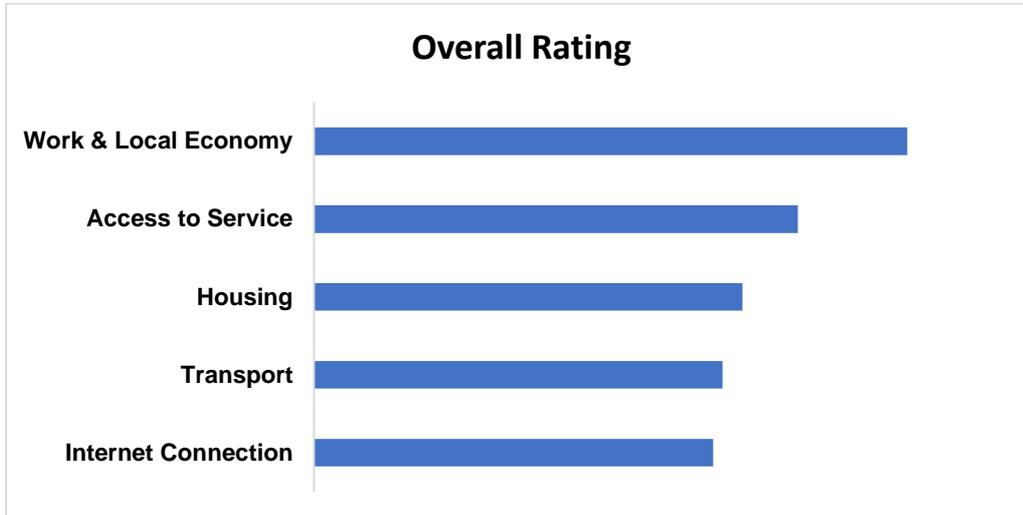

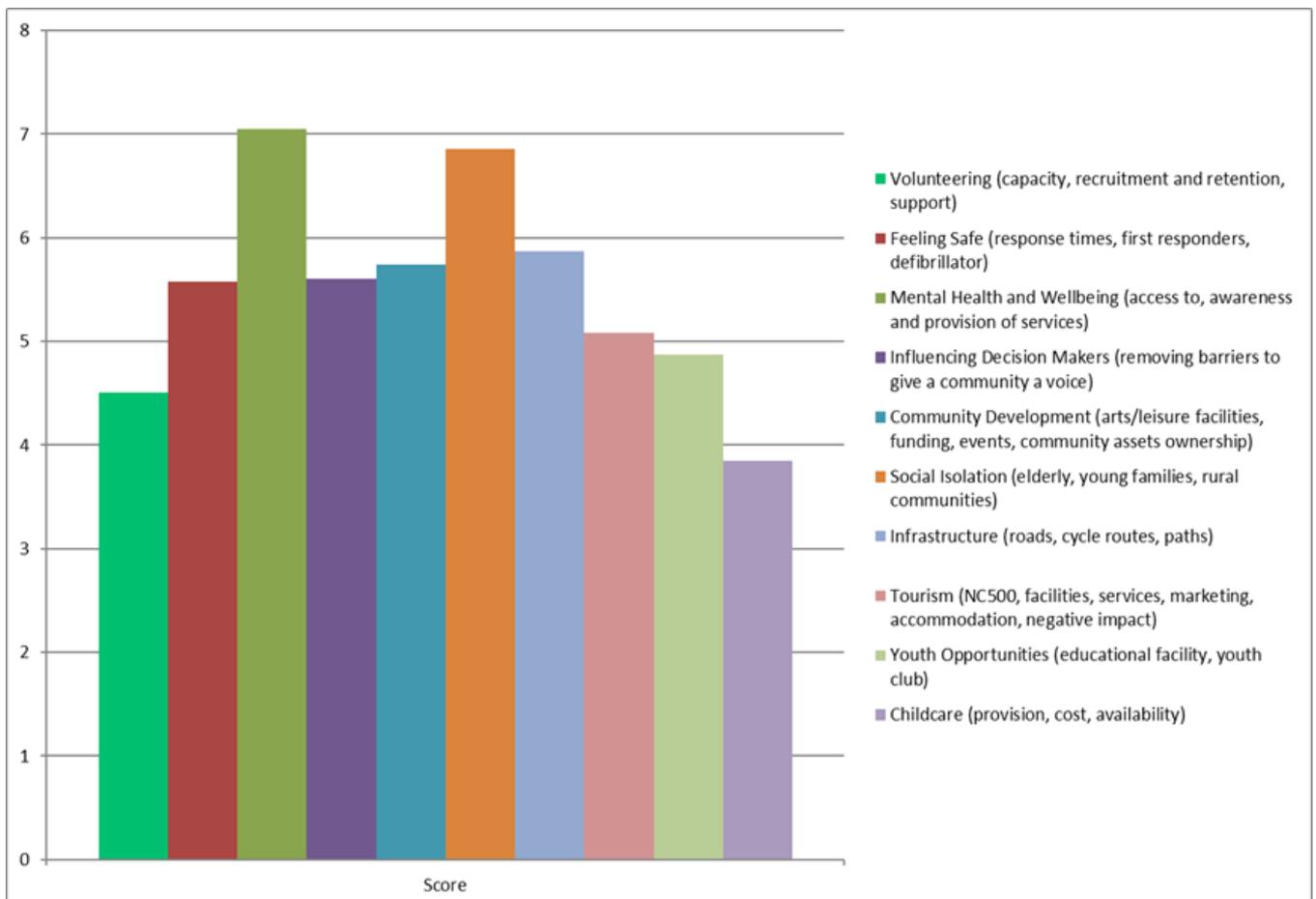
### Question:

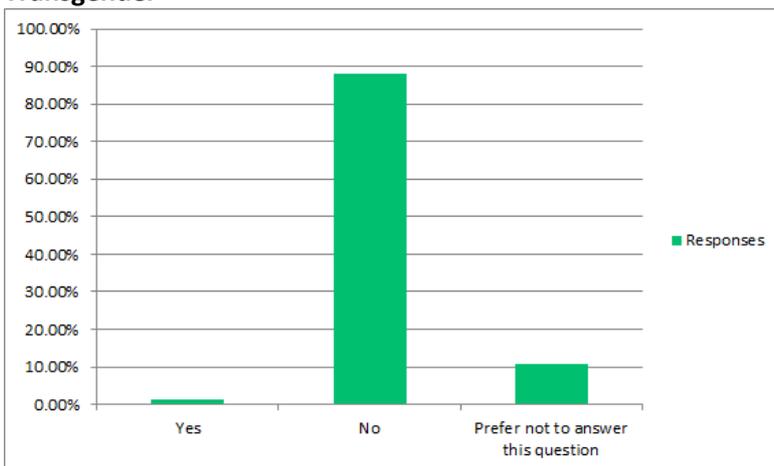

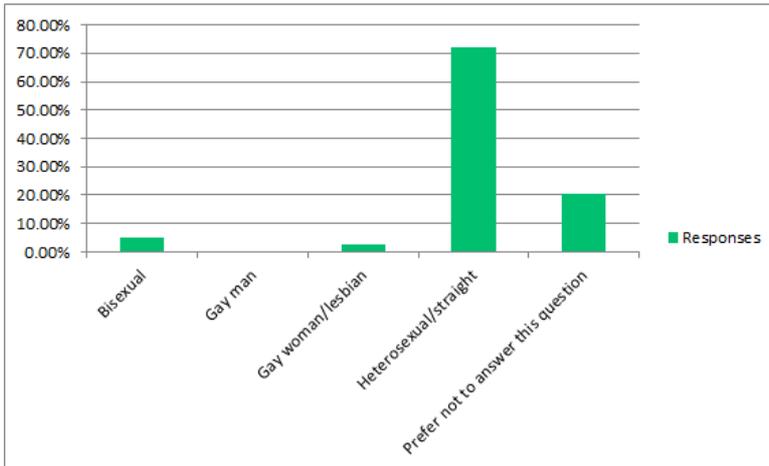

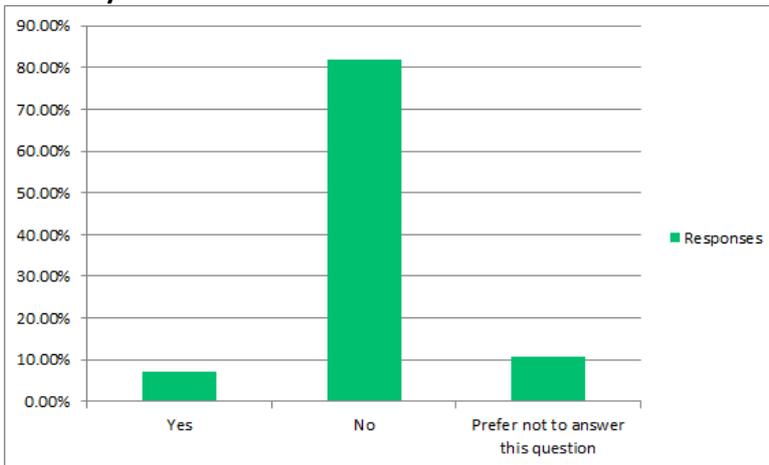

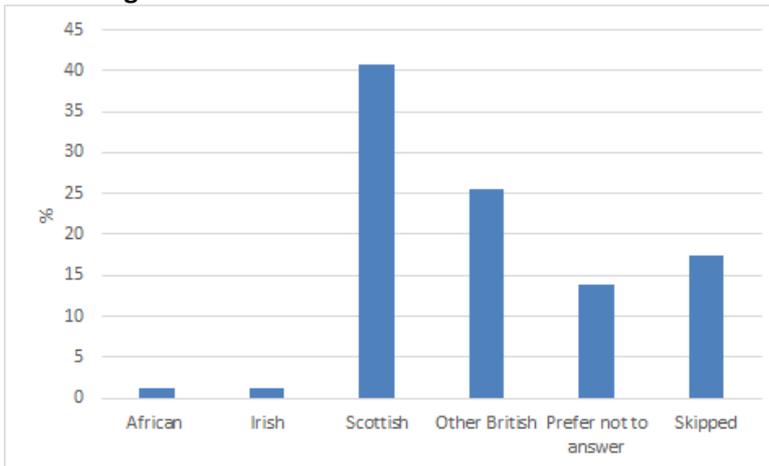

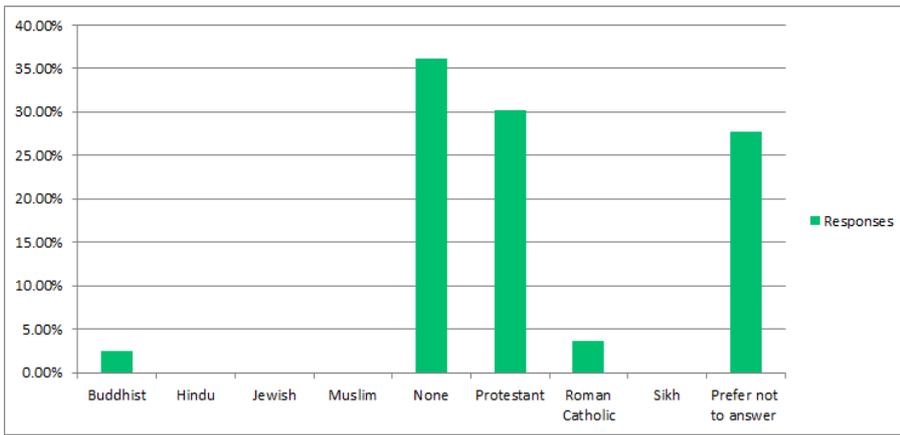
